## What is the Hill-Burton Act?

- Also called the "Hospital Survey and Construction Act"
- Was a Federal Law passed in 1946
  - Sponsored by Sen. Harold Burton (R-Ohio) and Sen. J. Lister Hill (D. Ala.)
- Donated money to hospitals to allow for updates and reconstructions

To receive the grants or loans, hospitals were required to:

- Provide services to all people living in the area without discrimination
- 2. offer free or discounted help to patients who couldn't pay for the care and services
- 3. Be actively participating in medicare and medicaid programs
- Bilingually post their information in both English and Spanish
- 5. Provide emergency services

## **Lasting Affect?**

Although the program has not been actively funded since 1997. There are still around 200 hospitals are still in compliance with the Hill-Burton Act

These hospitals are obligated to offer free or reduced-cost care to patients at or below federal poverty guidelines
